### Message from Monsignor

#### Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Thursday evening and Friday we celebrate the feast of the Assumption of Mary into heaven body and soul. This feast has in importance beyond simply being a teaching about Mary. It is a teaching about us. A popular false teaching has been that spirit is a good and matter is bad. The spiritual seems holy because it seems orderly and clean. The material world seems rather messy. It is the difference between the order of a book and the messiness of a jungle. Order seems good while messiness seems bad. Holy people are those who live in the orderly clean world of the spirit while evil comes from the messiness of the material world. The biggest danger with this heresy is that it leads to a sense of futility. There are few who can live entirely in the spirit world and be holy. Those who live in the material world of jobs and family are stuck in the evil world. If there is no hope for those who are stuck in evil of the material world, then a person might as well be as messy as possible. Why bother with self-discipline. A person may as well do whatever a given appetite moves him or her to do at that moment. So if one is hungry one eats whatever one feels like. If one is angry, you express that anger in whatever you want to. Similarly if there is a sexual urge you fulfill at that moment. The Catholic Church in contrast looks to the teaching of the book of Genesis and the moment of creation. As God creates the world, he declares each day of creation as good. The sin of Adam and Eve is not practice it is not their participation in the material world. Rather their sin is the desire to be God. The serpent tempts them by telling them God is preventing them from total independence when he forbids them experiencing the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Their sin is of pride wanting to be equal to God. Jesus comes into the world by letting go of all the glory due him as God. He chooses to become as human as possible, being born as a small child totally dependent on his parents. As he begins his ministry he proclaims that the kingdom of God is breaking into the world. Rather than rejecting the material world we see Jesus working with the world. He heals people, he shares meals with people and he welcomes conversations with people. Even his death is not abandoning of the material world, but a raising that world to be one with God. The Blessed Virgin Mary serves as our surrogate. We look at Mary to see who we are. Mary was the perfect disciple by choosing to say yes to God, when God sent the Angel to announce she is to be the mother of the Messiah. She brings us to Jesus and encourages us to ask for what we need from Jesus. Mary was important in bringing Jesus into the world as a mother and introduced Jesus to his ministry at the wedding of Cana. Now she teaches us the purpose of Jesus incarnation and redemption. Jesus became human, suffered and died for us was to promise us eternal life with God. This life is not just simply a soul living in some kind of isolated beauty. Rather Jesus wants us to live with him as entire persons. By proclaiming that Mary was assumed body and soul into heaven, the Church teaches that our goal is be complete human beings in life with God. Someday our bodies will be glorified so that we can truly live with God. We will not be isolated persons. The book of Revelation assures us that there will be a new heaven and a new earth. And so this holy day of the Assumption of Mary is meant to be a celebration of our hope that even the material world will be a world of glory and joy in the life of God. Rather than a sense of futility of living in the messiness of human life, we are called to rejoice in it. We work to bring Creation to its full identity as being a sign of God's love for all beings.

### [Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God](#)

The Latin Rite of the Catholic Church begins the year by celebrating the [Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God](#). On this day, we are reminded of the role that the Blessed Virgin played in the plan of our salvation. Christ's Birth at [Christmas](#), celebrated just a week before, was made possible by Mary's fiat: "Be it done unto me according to Thy word."

**Holy days of obligation** are feast days on which Catholics are required to attend Mass and to avoid (to the extent that they are able) servile work. The observance of Holy Days of Obligation is part of the Sunday Duty, the first of the Precepts of the Church.

**The Catholic Church** tells us that we have an obligation to go to Mass every Sunday. It is an obligation that most of us fulfill willingly, but many people don't understand why the Church requires this of us.

**Our Sunday Obligation:** In the Third Commandment, God tells us to "Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day." For the Jews, the Sabbath was Saturday; Christians, however, transferred the Sabbath to Sunday, the day of Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead. The Church tells us that we have an obligation to fulfill the Third Commandment by refraining from unnecessary work on Sunday and by participating in the Mass, our chief form of worship as Christians.
