MESSAGE FROM MONSIGNOR

SUMMERTIME REST

In the midst of summer, I would like to reflect on one of the gifts of summer. For most people this is a time of vacations or free weekends to provide rest and relaxation. One of the 10 Commandments is the result observe the Sabbath. We tend to think of that only in terms of going to church on Sundays. Although that is very important it really takes place in a larger context. Our faith tells us that the purpose of our creation is that we might come to serve, to know and to love God. Now, God does not need our work and energy. He simply chose to love us and so create us. The commands to observe the Sabbath is not for God's sake. Rather it is for our benefit. When we look at nature we see natural rhythms to everything. Since we are part of nature there are rhythms to our own existence. When we accept those rhythms and cycles in our own lives then we will be at our healthiest not just physically and emotionally but even spiritually. One of the rhythms is work and rest. Our society tends to glorify work but looks down on rest. Rest and quiet is one way in which we can renew our true humanity. In moments of quiet we can become aware of God's presence and action within us. Being not just flesh but also spiritual beings we have the presence of God always within us. Been busy prevents us from being aware of God's presence in our lives. God wants us to discover who we really are, children of God. Sometimes I think we are afraid to find out who we are. One things that amuses me when I travel between the parishes on Sunday mornings is the appearance of certain people who seem to need to do what appears to me to be unnecessary work. I probably am judging them unfairly but I often wonder why work on Sunday if you do not need to. Is it because the person is afraid to discover that there is something more important than work and money? But then I have to look at myself and realize how often I allow myself to be busy rather than simply quiet myself. It just seems like one of the temptations of the devil is to think that our activity is so important that we can never find time to just be in God's presence. The greatest gift we could give ourselves is to take advantage of moments of quiet in the summer season and listen to God tell us how much he loves us for who we are.

Financial Needs of Our Lady of Peace

I am hoping to send a letter to everyone next week but in the meantime I need to give a heads up. We are being hit with a lot of maintenance costs on the church at the moment. Even though we had some help with insurance, we still had two incidents with \$1000 deductible. These were the water damage around the restrooms in the church and the fascia that needed to be replaced and nailed down as a result of wind storms. The cause of the water damage near the restrooms was a leak in the tar that covered the shingles in the valley of the roof. We have put new tar but it is believed that we should have those valley re-shingled. The costs of re-shingling the two valleys would be about \$ 2000. You may have noticed this week that the church was warm while the social hall was comfortable. This week we discovered that the unit that cools (and heats the church in the winter) is out of Freon and the twin compressors are worn out and need to be replaced. The cost of this will be \$5,300.00. These are mandatory costs if we are going to keep the church going. We are in need of whatever help you can give us for these expenses.

LUKE 12:13-21

In order to fully appreciate its significance, today's gospel should be understood as a small portion of the lengthy instruction Jesus imparted to his followers en route to Jerusalem (Luke 9:51-19:28). Just prior to this lesson on greed and undue attachment to material wealth, Jesus had counseled his disciples against all anxiety, telling them that the God who knew their needs and wants would never forget them. Therefore, they need not live in fear of anything or anyone; the presence of the Holy Spirit would sustain them in every circumstance (12:1-12). In today's gospel, and in response to the question of "someone in the crowd" (v. 13), Jesus challenges those who seek to allay their fears by making an abundance of material goods their base of security and their insurance against the future. As Luke Timothy Johnson (The Gospel of Luke, The Liturgical Press, Collegeville" 1991) has pointed out, "Jesus' teaching to this point (in the gospel) has stressed a lack of fear before the immediate threat of life, how much less should fear generate an obsessive concern with possessions.

Jesus' lesson about greed and wealth was prompted by a request that he act as arbiter in a dispute over an inheritance. Certainly, Jesus had wisdom and intelligence sufficient to settle the issue, however he chose not to become embroiled in matters material, particularly since he was directing the attention of his disciples toward the more enduring treasure of the kingdom. As his followers, they would become heirs of an eternal inheritance; therefore all their other needs and wants were to be subordinated and ordered accordingly. Because earthly possessions do not guarantee life (v. 15), Jesus taught his own that their energies should not be spent in having more but in becoming more and more like him.
