MESSAGE FROM MONSIGNOR EUCCHARISTIC PRAYERS V

Last week as I was discussing the *epiclesis*, I forgot to mention that during this laying of hands the altar server in many places would ring a bell to alert worshippers that a climactic point in the Eucharistic prayer was happening. The bell would also be rung at the next part of the Eucharist: the institution narrative or consecration. The institution narrative repeats the actions and words of Christ during the Last Supper in which He offered His body and blood to the Father under the form of bread and wine and then gave them to the Apostles to eat and drink. He then commanded them to repeat this same mystery.

During the words of the institution there is a minor elevation of the gifts during which the priest makes a slight bow as he says the words of consecration. After the words are said the priest then raises each species to a full elevation. There is a pattern of elevation that may not be noticeable at first because they happen in their own contexts.

There is a slight elevation as the priest receives the gifts of bread and wine during the preparation of the gifts. This elevation of lifting of the gifts is the first stage of offering our gifts and ourselves to the Father with Christ. The next elevation towards God is during the words of institution. We finally give ourselves fully to God through the sacrifice of Jesus in the full elevation as we join our spirits to the body and blood of Jesus. There will be a lower elevation at the Great Amen as well as after the Lamb of God when the priest says Behold, the Lamb of God. The final elevation will be at communion. The pattern of elevations expresses the movement of our hearts with Jesus. We lift our hearts to God with Jesus as He renews His sacrifice. God then returns that gift to us in a movement that culminates in our being sacramentally united with the body and blood of Christ in communion. We lift our hearts to God with Jesus and God then fills us with the His very life in communion.

A significant difference in the translations is the term for whom is Christ's blood poured out. In the old translation it was *for you and for all*. The new translation has *for you and for many*. The translation is not trying to limit who will receive the gift of salvation. Rather it is trying to get closer to Biblical terminology. Isaiah and Matthew both emphasize that the Messiah must suffer for the many. The word many seems to be a more poetic way of showing inclusivity. Jesus did not die for us as individuals; he died and rose to make us a People of God, His body. Salvation is not just between me and God, when we experience heaven we will have an intimate friendship not just with our loved ones that we knew on earth. We will have a mystical connection with every person who has accepted that gift of salvation given to us by the power of the Holy Spirit.


